












The NSW State Emergency Service

The NSW State Emergency Service (NSW SES) is the most versatile and widely used rescue and public safety organisation in New South Wales. Around 10,000 volunteers are ready to assist their community through a wide range of emergencies.

The NSW SES began in 1955 as a result of devastating floods across NSW, particularly in the Hunter Region where loss of life as well as massive damage to property and infrastructure occurred. The NSW SES has grown and diversified since this time and has been instrumental in the response to many disasters and emergencies, not only in NSW but across Australia.

The State Headquarters of the NSW SES is located in Wollongong with 17 Region Headquarters located across the state. There are more than 228 volunteer units around metropolitan and regional NSW, supported by their local councils.

The NSW SES is the lead agency in the response to floods, storms and tsunami in NSW. The NSW SES also supports other emergency services in times of natural and manmade disasters and is committed to building safer and more resilient communities.

Floods and storms are the most damaging and costly disasters which the communities of NSW face. Most people experience several storms or floods in their lifetime and are likely to need the assistance of NSW SES at some time.

How can the NSW SES help?

The NSW SES aims to help keep people safe, build community resilience and minimise the risks to life and property when emergencies occur.

NSW SES volunteers are highly trained in responding in emergency situations. Types of training include:



storm and water damage responses



first aid



equipment use



operational management



logistics



search and rescue techniques



media



administration and many other operational areas.

These skills are used to respond in emergency situations to help keep communities safe and protect life and property.

Another major role of the NSW SES is to ensure local communities are aware and educated on how best to prepare their homes and properties in the event of a flood, storm or tsunami.

NSW SES emergency roles

The NSW SES takes part in many diverse emergency roles. These roles vary from unit to unit according to local needs and accreditation including:

Flood Management – including warning, evacuation, rescue and the provision of essential supplies to people isolated by floodwater

Storm Damage Control – securing (making safe) and making temporary repairs to roofs, removing fallen trees from buildings and rescuing trapped people

Tsunami Response – including warning, evacuation and rescue

Rescue – including Road Crash Rescue, Vertical Rescue and General Rescue

Land Search – the NSW SES assists NSW Police with land searches for lost and missing people as well as searches for evidence

Community Engagement – working with your community to help build local resilience to flood, storm and tsunami

Community First Responder – appropriately trained NSW SES volunteers respond and provide advanced first aid in some isolated communities until professional medical assistance arrives

Emergency Services Liaison – assisting other agencies in the management of disasters such as bushfires, earthquakes, landslides and technological disasters
